FACULTY DIRECTORY

Sheng-Ju Chan, Ph.D, Professor of Higher Education in the Graduate Institute of Education and Chief Executive Officer of the International Masters' Program in Educational Leadership and Management Development at the National Chung Cheng University, Taiwan. His areas of special interest are higher education policy, comparative education and higher education

management. He is author of over a dozen publications in Chinese and English, and also a higher education policy advisor to the Ministry of Education in Taiwan. His recent articles have focused on cross-border education, internationalization and student mobility in Asia and have been published in well-respected international journals such as the *Asia Pacific Journal of Education*, *Higher Education Policy* and the *Journal of Higher Education Policy and Management*. Specializing in education in East Asia, Professor Chan is the associate editor of the international journal *Asian Education and Development Studies* published by Emerald. He is also the co-editor of a book series, *Higher Education in Asia*, supported by Springer. Professor Chan is substantially involved with the comparative education studies community and is the former Secretary-General of the Chinese Taipei Comparative Education Society in Taiwan receiving the Society's research award in 2011.

Christopher S. Collins, Ph.D. is Assistant Professor of Higher Education at Azusa Pacific University and Associate Director of APHERP. His research interests include the role of higher education related to poverty reduction, knowledge extension, public good, and social rates of return. Recent publications include edited volumes related to APHERP including: *University-community engagement in the Asia Pacific: Public benefits beyond individual degrees* (in press), *Handbook of Asian higher education* (2016) with Neubauer, Hawkins, and Lee, and *Redefining Asian Pacific higher education in dynamic global contexts* (2015) with Neubauer.

Alexander Jun, Ph.D., is Professor of higher education at Azusa Pacific University, a TED speaker, and the author of *From Here to University: Access, Mobility, and Resilience Among Urban Latino Youth* (Routledge Press, 2001). He has published extensively on issues of postsecondary access for historically underrepresented students in underserved areas, and recently completed a three-year narrative inquiry research project on the educational mobility and academic resilience of Khmer orphans, which he's completing a book about. Jun conducts research on issues surrounding higher education globalization in the Pacific Rim, and while studying at the University of Southern California, he earned a Ford Foundation fellowship to conduct research on college preparation programs for urban youth. Jun teaches courses on diversity and social justice in higher education, comparative higher education, and qualitative research methods, and joined APU after 15 years as a faculty member and administrator at USC.

Dr. Molly N.N. Lee is the recently retired (Dec. 2011) Coordinator of the Asia-Pacific Programme of Educational Programme for Development (APEID) and Programme Specialist in Higher Education at UNESCO Asia and the Pacific Regional Bureau for Education in Bangkok. As the Coordinator of APEID, she ran programs on higher education, technical and vocational education, education for sustainable development and ICT in education. Prior to joining

UNESCO Bangkok, she was a Professor of Education at the University of Science, Penang, Malaysia. Dr. Lee has a Ph.D. in International Development Education, a Master's degree in Sociology from Stanford University, and a Master's in Education Planning and Development from University of London Institute of Education. Her research interests are higher education, teacher education, ICT in education and education for sustainable development. Her publications include: *“Restructuring Higher Education in Malaysia”*, *“Private Higher Education in Malaysia”*, *“Malaysian Universities: Towards Equality, Accessibility, Quality”*, *“The Corporatisation of a Public University: Influence of Market Forces and State Control”* and *“Global Trends, National Policies and Institutional Responses: Restructuring Higher Education”*.

Deane Neubauer is Professor Emeritus in the Department of Political Science at the University of Hawaii, Manoa, Senior Research Fellow of the Globalization Research Center (UHM) and Co-Director of the Asia Pacific Higher Education Research Partnership. Educated at the University of California, Riverside and Yale University (Ph.D. 1965) in political science, he has taught additionally at the University of California (Berkeley and Irvine), Waikato University (NZ) and the University of Sydney. His research interests lie in health policy, political economy, education and globalization. His work explores globalization phenomena as a major vector of social change throughout the world. He served as the chair of the Department of Political Science (1974-1978), as founding dean of the College of Social Sciences at the University of Hawaii, Manoa (1980-88) and was the founding director of the Globalization Research Center at the University of Hawaii, Manoa and subsequently Executive Director of the Globalization Research Network, a collaboration of four US universities. He served as Chancellor of the University of Hawaii, Manoa from 2001-2002 and as Vice President for Academic Affairs for the University of Hawaii System from 2001-2004. He has worked extensively throughout the United States in higher education accreditation, having served as a member of the Western Association of Schools and Colleges (Senior Commission) from 1995-2001, with whom he continues to work.
